

THE SACRIFICE LEADERSHIP LAWRENCE SHENKIN SHEVET HINEINI

A common rebuke in the verbal arsenal of the lewish mother is "you are being a chillul Hashem" - meaning "you are profaning the name of God." This week's parasha introduces us to the ban on such an act, we are told: "Do not profane My holy Name" (Vayikra 22:32). The ibn Ezra sees the command as a localised one, cautioning the kohanim, and only them, about their conduct in the mishkan. Interpreting this verse in 2015, Rabbi Jonathan Sacks zt"l expressed dismay at the plague of reports of immoral behaviour from Jewish and Israeli spiritual and political leaders. As the Rabbi noted, what is at stake is "more than simple morality... when the guilty are leaders, something more is involved: chillul Hashem" ('Sanctifying the Name,' Covenant and Conversation). It is interesting to note that though in the colloquial usage, it is an accusation levied against young children primarily, yet amongst our Rebbeim and leaders, it is one levied very precisely and specifically towards the elite of Jewish society. In fact, that seems to be the broad message of this week's parasha: the higher standard that kohanim are held to as a result of their privileged status.

The Gemara in *Beitza* 15b recounts an incident involving Rabbi Eliezer and his students. During a lecture on the laws of *Yom Tov*, groups of students began to leave one by one. Rabbi Eliezer commented on the reason for each group's departure, with the first group leaving because of an intense distraction towards physical pleasures, and the subsequent groups being distracted by decreasing levels of physical pleasure. However, when the last group began to leave, Rabbi Eliezer called them "desolate"

people" and criticized them more harshly than the others, even though they stayed for most of the lecture.

The Steipler Rav explained that Rabbi Eliezer's response to the last group reflects the idea that the more learned a person is, the greater the expectations are for their behaviour and dedication to Torah study. The last group of students, who were likely the most learned and immersed in Torah study, should have been the most sensitive to the value of every word of Torah, and therefore Rabbi Eliezer was particularly disappointed with their behaviour – they are held to a higher standard.

From here, one might see the position of leadership as unenviable, and the leaders of previous generations would agree. Moshe Rabbeinu laments "Why have You dealt ill with Your servant, and why have I not enjoyed Your favor, that You have laid the burden of all this people upon me?" (Shemot 11:11). The Chafetz Chaim warns that it is precisely the leaders of the lewish people who are most likely to fall into the trap of the spies, i.e., making a mockery of our geula process, due to their position (Ma'amar Tzipita Liyshua). Rabbi Elie Munk notes the strong likelihood of a King to go astray (The Call of the Torah, Vayikra). Ultimately, Rabbi Sacks put it succinctly: "Leadership is stressful and emotionally demanding." (Seven Principles of Jewish Leadership).

Bearing this in mind, it is incumbent upon us to recognise and appreciate the great burden that our leaders carry for us, and to not readily mock or envy them without careful consideration.


