SPIRITUAL GROWTH SAMMY GARFINKEL SHEVET SEENAI

This shabbat is Rosh Chodesh Elul and the beginning of the run-up

to the Yamim Noraim. Throughout the whole of this month, many people take upon themselves stringencies in order to better themselves and prepare for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Why do we have this idea of taking on new things? Is it not enough just to go into the new year with a headful of intent and a heart full of prayer? Looking into this week's parasha may give us some answers.

Parashat Re'eh continues with Moshe's final talk to Am Yisrael. In Perek 1^(*), we are told about the ways in which we are, and aren't, allowed to worship G-d once we are settled in the land of Israel (in terms of sacrificial services). The final passuk of the perek exclaims the following:

לאיתַעֲשָּׁה כֵן לַה' אֱלֵקִידְּ כִּי כליתוֹעֲבָת ה' אֲשֶׁר שְׁנֵא אָשׂוּ לַאלהיהֶם כִּי גַם אֶת־בְּנֵיהֶם וְאֶת־בְּנֹתֵיהֶם יִשְׂרְפוּ בְאֵשׁ לַאלהיהֶם:

You shall not act thus toward your G-d Hashem, for they perform for their gods every abhorrent act that Hashem detests; they even offer up their sons and daughters in fire to their gods.

For context, it is talking about the way the Cana'anite people worshipped their gods. A question may arise from this passuk: why did the Torah specifically mentioned child sacrifices as opposed to other abhorrent acts that we know the Cana'anites did? It can't be to emphasise the fact that killing children is bad, and an incorrect service to G-d, as this is obvious even without it being spelled out to the Jewish people. It also can't be there to point out that killing children is worse than killing adults or the elderly, as we are taught that all lives are of equal value. It must be teaching us something about specifically WHY this act is an incorrect service.

On the most symbolic level, the idea of young children represents a special type of innocence. Not particularly one of purity, but one of possibility and spiritual growth. When you are young, you have your whole life ahead of you, and are susceptible to your surroundings. You have amazing potential for good, or for bad. But when you take that potential for good, and you completely destroy it, that is what Hashem hates, and that is the 'abhorrence' that the Torah could be trying to hint to.

It is such an amazing opportunity the Torah gives us here; an insight into how to be favourable in Hashem's eyes. If Hashem hates a destruction/lack of spiritual growth, then the opposite must be true for what Hashem loves. Every time we do an act of kindness or refrain from saying Lashon Harah even for a second, that is another step towards spiritual growth and bettering ourselves as individuals, and Hashem LOVES that. And now we see why we have this seemingly odd custom of taking on incremental ideas to better ourselves over this period. It's all about doing the most we can to be favourable in Hashem's eyes, so that we may receive a good judgement for the coming year.
