SHABBAT THE VOICE OF BNEI AKIVA UK THE MOST WIDELY DISTRIBUTED YOUTH TORAH PERIODICAL IN THE UK

Parshat Vayikra begins: וַיִּקְרֵא אֶל־מֹשֶׁה וַיִּדְבּל יִיּקְרָא אֶל־מֹשֵה לֵאמְר: - "And He called to Moshe and Hashem spoke to him from the Tent of Meeting saying: [1:1]"

Unlike at Har Sinai where all of the Bnei Yisrael heard Hashem speak, Rashi explains that the voice of Hashem only reached Moshe's ears and that past the Ohel Moed (Tent of meeting), Hashem wasn't heard. One may assume that Hashem's voice was quiet, however in Tehillim, the pesukim suggest anything but: קוֹל ה, שַׁבֶּר מִל ה, בַּבַּתַ, קוֹל ה, שַּׁבַּר and קוֹל ה, שַׁבַּר and קוֹל ה, שַׁבַּר and קוֹל ה, שַׁבַּר and קוֹל ה, בַּבַּתַ, קוֹל ה, בַּתַחָ,

אָרְדִּים "The voice of Hashem is powerful, the voice of Hashem is full of majesty, the voice of Hashem breaks cedars...

[Tehillim 29:4-5]"

This leaves little question as to the power of Hashem's voice, thus suggesting

that His voice reached Moshe but stopped at the perimeter of the Ohel Moed. Why did Hashem miraculously make Hashem's voice stop and not be heard outside the Ohel Mo'ed?

In Darchei Mussar, Rav Yaakov Naiman, z"l, describes that it actually wasn't a miracle at all. He uses the example of how the world we live in is filled with radio waves and that the more powerful the apparatus, the greater the ability to sense delicate signals. Likewise, the Bnei Yisrael did not hear the voice of Hashem as it resounded throughout the world, as they were not worthy of it. When in the

Ohel Mo'ed, Moshe was in the correct and unique environment to experience an increase in personal growth and was therefore able to spiritually uplift his physical body to enable his ears to attune to the voice of Hashem.

Rabbi Yehoshua ben Levi said: Each day, a heavenly voice emerges from Har Sinai proclaiming: 'Bring hardship to the creations for disgracing the Torah. [Mishna Avot 6:2]. He heard this daily and worked to reduce the disgrace. We however, do not hear the heavenly voice and continue

as normal, without giving it a second thought. The Sages teach that thunder was created to "straighten out the crookedness of the heart." One can hear thunder and one can hear thunder. It all depends on the level of awareness - how

attuned we are to Hashem and Hashem's messages. The message can be so powerful and we can be so otherwise absorbed.

Today we enter into the month of Nissan, a time for redemption. It is our duty to engage in personal growth by opening our ears, tuning into the voice of Hashem and 'hearing' the messages given to us. If we are able to achieve this change in focus, the potential impact could be huge. Shabbat Shabom

To Be a Role Model

This week's parsha begins dealing intensively with the various sacrifices that are to be brought in the newly constructed Mishkan, and later, the Beit HaMikdash. As part of this discussion, we are told of sacrifices that people must bring when they inadvertently sin, with different sacrifices being brought by the different people or groups. For example, we are told of separate sacrifices for the "anointed Kohen" (4:3-12), if the majority of Bnei Yisrael sin (4:13-21), if a leader, a "nasi", sins (4:22-26), and finally, if an individual sins (4:27-35).

For most of these individual sections, the Torah introduces them by using a conditional Hebrew term, either א (if) or יס (when). However, when discussing the sin of the leader, the Torah uses a different word (4:22): אשר נשיא יחטא ועשה אחת מכל־מצות ה' אלקיו

In case it is a chieftain who incurs guilt by doing unwittingly any of the things which by the commandment of the LORD his God ought not to be done, and he realizes his guilt—(translation from Sefaria.org).

Although translators (understandably) translate this word in the conditional as well, $\mbox{$\mathbb{N}$}$ is usually translated as "that". "That the leader will sin..." is a confusing way linguistically to start a sentence. Commenting on this unique phrasing, the Gemara interprets it as follows (Horiyot 10):

"אשר נשיא יחטא". אמר רבן יוחנן בן זכאי: אשרי

אם על שגגתו. אם על מביא קרבן על שגגתו. אם על שגגתו מביא חטאת, צריך לומר על זדונו? אם נשיא ?שלו מביא חטאת, צריך לומר מהו הדיוט?

"In case a chieftain sins" Rabbi Yochanan Ben Zakkai said "Happy (אשרה") is the generation whose leader bring a sacrifice on his error. If he does so on his error, is it necessary to say that he does so when wilfully violating something? And if the generation's leader brings an offering on an error, is it necessary to say that regular people (would do so as well)?

Rabbi Yochanan Ben Zakkai is viewing it as praiseworthy that a leader is capable of admitting mistakes. It is praiseworthy not only in terms of their own ability to recognise where they've gone wrong (either accidentally or on purpose) but also in their ability to affect those who follow them.

In general, we look to our leaders to guide as, not just with their public proclamations, but more with their personal example. One of the best pieces of advice I received as a madrich was "Don't worry too much about teaching the ideology. Focus on building personal relationships and the ideology will be taught through your example, because that's who you are." Fancy words, great speeches or amazing hadracha can only go so far: at the end of the day, our actions and who we are as people speak far louder than our words. May we be zoche to be proper role models for all those who look up to us.

Dvar Halacha: Weekly Question

QUESTION: How do I kasher my oven for Pesach? ANSWER: To kasher your oven for Pesach, you must first clean the oven thoroughly, using strong cleaners and steel wool to clean all five walls and the door. After removing all of the food remnants, check with your bare hand, as well as a clean kitchen towel, that the interior is actually clean. After that, turn the oven on to its highest temperature for an hour to kasher it. Regarding the racks, it would be advisable to order an extra set of racks that you can then use on Pesach. Where this is not possible, leave the racks in the oven while it

is being kashered, and then put silver foil on the racks in a way that would ensure no direct contact between the rack and anything put in the oven over Pesach (while still allowing air to circulate freely in the oven). The above method is not sufficient for kashering toaster ovens or microwave ovens. Interested in learning more about kashering your kitchen for Pesach?
